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NOTE

The World Conference for Action against Apartheid, held from 22 to 26 August 1977 in Lagos, Nigeria, adopted by acclamation a Declaration reaffirming the determination of the international community to take effective concerted action to secure a speedy elimination of apartheid and pledging support and solidarity for the oppressed peoples of southern Africa and their liberation movements. The Declaration also called upon the United Nations Security Council to take all necessary measures, under Chapter VII of the Charter, to ensure the full implementation of the arms embargo against South Africa.

The Conference, organized by the United Nations in co-operation with the Organization of African Unity (OAU) and the Federal Government of Nigeria, was the largest international gathering ever on the issue of apartheid, with the participation of 112 Governments, 12 intergovernmental organizations, 5 liberation movements, 51 non-governmental organizations, as well as a number of prominent individuals.

The Conference was chaired by H.E. Brigadier Joseph N. Garba, the Commissioner for External Affairs of Nigeria, and heard keynote speeches by the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Head of State of Nigeria, the President of Zambia and the Prime Minister of Norway, as well as other prominent personalities.

In addition to the plenary meetings, the Conference set up a Commission to consider proposals for further action, with special reference to the promotion of increased political and material support to the oppressed people of South Africa

and their national liberation movement, and the implementation of United Nations resolutions on apartheid. The report of the Commission was received by the World Conference at its concluding session on 26 August and annexed to the report of the Conference.

The proposals contained in the report were endorsed on 15 September by the Special Committee against Apartheid which decided to recommend them for adoption by the thirty-second session of the United Nations General Assembly.

This issue of Notes and Documents contains the text of the Lagos Declaration, the report of the Commission and the list of participants in the Conference.

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THE LAGOS DECLARATION FOR ACTION AGAINST APARTHEID

The World Conference for Action against Apartheid, organized by the United Nations, in co-operation with the Organization of African Unity and the Federal Government of Nigeria, met in Lagos, Nigeria, from 22 to 26 August 1977, with the participation of representatives of 112 Governments, 12 intergovernmental organizations,

5 liberation movements, 5 non-governmental organizations, as well as a number of prominent individuals.

1. The Conference heard keynote speeches from the Head of State of Nigeria, the President of Zambia and the Prime Minister of Norway, as well as other prominent personalities.

2. After a full discussion of the items on its agenda, the Conference adopted the following Declaration.

I

5. The Conference reiterates the universal abhorrence of apartheid and racism in all its forms and manifestations and the determination of the international community to secure its speedy elimination.

4. The Conference reaffirms support and solidarity for the oppressed peoples of southern Africa and their national liberation movements, and the commitment of Governments and peoples of the world to take actions to contribute towards the eradication of apartheid.

5. Apartheid, the policy of institutionalized racist domination and exploitation imposed by a minority regime in South Africa, is a flagrant violation of the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. It rests on the dispossession, plunder, exploitation and social deprivation of the African people since 1652 by colonial settlers and their descendants. It is a crime against the conscience and dignity of mankind. It has resulted in immense suffering and involved the forcible moving of millions of Africans under special laws restricting their freedom of movement, and the denial of elementary human rights to the great majority of the population, as well as the violation of the inalienable right to self-determination of all of the people of South

Africa. This inhuman policy has been enforced by ruthless measures of repression and has led to escalating tension and conflict.

6. The apartheid regime in South Africa is the bastion of racism and colonialism in southern Africa and is one of the main opponents of the efforts of the United Nations and the international community to promote self-determination and independence in the area.

7. It has continued illegally to occupy the Territory of Namibia, for which the United Nations has a special responsibility, and extended apartheid to that international Territory.

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8. It has sustained and supported the illegal racist minority regime in Southern Phodesia, and has constantly resorted to threats against neighbouring independent African States and violations of their sovereignty. Since the end of colonial rule in Angola and Mozambique it has engaged in a series of acts of aggression against neighbouring States and has connived at acts of aggression by the illegal regime in Southern Rhodesia, Its massive invasion of Angola and constant violations of the territorial integrity of Zambia have been condemned by the United Nations Security Council. It continues to violate the territorial integrity of neighbouring independent African States.

9. The policies and actions of the South African regime have already created an explosive situation in the whole of southern Africa and events have moved into the phase of an acute crisis. The apartheid regime has intensified its military activities along the borders of independent African States and is constructing and expanding new military bases. It is reinforcing its enormous military arsenal and the production of nuclear weapons is within its reach. The possession of this arsenal and the acquisition of nuclear weapons by this racist and aggressive regime constitutes a menace to all independent African States and the whole world.

II

10. The World Conference recalls with admiration the valiant efforts of the South African people for many decades for an end to racial discrimination and for the establishment of a non-racial society. By their courageous struggle at heavy sacrifice, the South African people, under the leadership of their national liberation movement, have made a significant contribution to the purposes of the United Nations.

11. The United Nations has solemnly recognized the legitimacy of the struggle of the South African people for freedom and human equality, and for enabling all the people of the country, irrespective of race, colour or creed, to participate as equals in the determination of the destiny of the nation. It has proclaimed that the United Nations and the international community have a special responsibility towards the oppressed people of South Africa and their national liberation movement, and towards those imprisoned, restricted or exiled for their struggle against apartheid.

12. The World Conference pledges its full support to the legitimate

aspirations of the South African people and urges Governments, organizations and individuals to provide all appropriate assistance to the oppressed people of South Africa and their national liberation movement in their just struggle for freedom and human equality.

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13. The Conference rejects all aspects of the apartheid system, including the imposition of "bantustans" which divide the population, deprive the African people of their citizenship and inalienable right to self-determination, and deny them a just share of the wealth of the country. There can be no international co-operation with bantustans and other entities based on racism.

14. The Conference condemns all manoeuvres by the South African regime aimed at preserving racist domination and the system of exploitation and oppression in South Africa, and in southern Africa as a whole.

15. It calls upon all Governments to enact legislation declaring the recruitment, assembly, financing and training of mercenaries in their territories to be punishable as a criminal act and to do their utmost to discourage and prohibit their nationals from serving as mercenaries.

16. It declares that South Africa belongs to all its people irrespective of race, colour or creed and that all have the right to live and work there in conditions of full equality. The system of racist domination must be replaced by majority rule and the participation of all the people on the basis of equality in all phases of national life, in freely determining the political, economic and social character of their society and in freely disposing their natural resources.

III

17. The Conference calls upon Governments, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations to intensify the campaign for the further isolation of the apartheid regime with a view to complementing the efforts of the South African people and their national liberation movement and to ensure:

(a) The immediate and total elimination of the policy and practice of apartheid and granting of equal rights to all its inhabitants, including equal political rights;

(b) The termination of all measures, under whatever name, which forcibly separate elements of the population on the basis of race;

(c) The dismantling of the system of apartheid and the policy of bantustanization, and abrogation of all racially discriminatory laws and measures;

(d) The ending of repression against the opponents of apartheid, and the immediate and unconditional release of all persons, imprisoned, detained, restricted or exiled for their opposition to apartheid;

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(e) The exercise, freely and on the basis of equality, of

the inalienable right to self-determination of the people of South Africa as a whole;

(f) The removal of the illegal South African forces of occupation in Namibia and compliance by the apartheid régime with the relevant Security Council resolutions, particularly resolution 385 (1976);

(g) Compliance by the South African régime with Security Council resolutions on the question of Southern Rhodesia, and full implementation of sanctions against the illegal racist minority regime, including the oil embargo;

(h) The immediate cessation by the apartheid regime of all aggressive acts and threats against the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of African States; and

(i) The immediate cessation by the apartheid regime of military and nuclear build-up which constitutes a serious danger to international peace and security.

18. The World Conference recognizes that the continuation of the prevailing situation in South Africa, and in southern Africa as a whole, will inevitably lead to greater conflict in Africa with enormous repercussions to international peace and security.

19. The World Conference condemns the South African regime for its ruthless repressive measures which are designed to perpetuate white racist domination. It recognizes and respects the inalienable right of the oppressed South African people and their national liberation movement to resort to all available and appropriate means of their choice to secure their freedom, and the need to assist them to achieve freedom. It declares that the international community has an inescapable duty to take all necessary measures to ensure the triumph of freedom and human equality in South Africa.

20. It further calls upon the international community to assist States which have been subjected to pressure, threats and acts of aggression by the South African régime because of their opposition to apartheid and implementations of United Nations resolutions for action against apartheid.

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21. Governments and organizations participating in the World Conference pledge to use their separate and collective efforts forthwith, and on a continuing basis, to bring about the elimination of apartheid, to provide assistance to the victims of oppression, and to lend appropriate support to their national liberation movements in consultation with the United Nations and the OAU, in their legitimate struggle to eliminate apartheid, and to attain the inalienable right to self-determination of the South African people as a whole.

22. The Conference commends those States and organizations which have provided assistance to the oppressed people and their national liberation movement, and appeals to all States and organizations to increase such assistance.

23. It draws attention to the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid.
24. The Conference calls upon all States for the cessation of any assistance or co-operation enabling South Africa to obtain nuclear capability. It further calls upon all States to prevent companies or institutions within their jurisdiction from any nuclear co-operation with South Africa.
25. The Conference solemnly calls upon all States to cease forthwith all sales and supplies of arms and military equipment, spare parts and components thereof; to withdraw all licences for the manufacture of arms and military equipment in South Africa and to refrain from any assistance to the South African regime in its military build-up or any military co-operation with that regime. It further recommends the setting up of a watchdog committee to follow up the observance of the arms embargo.
26. It calls on the United Nations Security Council to take all necessary measures, under Chapter VII of the Charter, to ensure the full implementation of the arms embargo against South Africa.
27. The Conference recognizes the urgent need for economic, and other measures, universally applied, to secure the elimination of apartheid. It commends all Governments which have taken such measures in accordance with United Nations resolutions. It calls upon the United Nations and all Governments, as well as economic interests, including transnational corporations, urgently to consider such measures, including the cessation of loans to, and investments in, South Africa. It requests the Special Committee against Apartheid, in co-operation with the OAU and all other appropriate organizations, to promote the implementation of the above recommendations.

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28. The Conference urges States, and international and national sporting bodies to take all appropriate steps within their jurisdiction to bring about the termination of all sporting contacts with South Africa.
29. It commends all public organizations which have taken actions in accordance with United Nations resolutions and in support of the legitimate struggle of the oppressed people of South Africa.

IV

30. The World Conference calls on all the Governments and peoples of the world to lend their full support to international efforts, under the auspices of the United Nations and in co-operation with the Organization of African Unity and the liberation movements recognized by it, to eliminate apartheid and enable the South African people as a whole to attain their inalienable right to self-determination.
31. The Conference expresses its solidarity with the oppressed people of South Africa and with all political prisoners and detainees in South Africa, and pledges the total support of all participants to continue and intensify their campaign for the immediate and unconditional release of all political

prisoners and detainees. It further pledges its unswerving support to all efforts to end arbitrary arrests, detentions and political trials in South Africa.

32. It endorses the proposal to proclaim 1978 as the International Anti-apartheid Year and appeals to all Governments and organizations to observe it in the spirit of this Declaration.

33. : The liberation of southern Africa as a whole from colonial and racist rule will be the final step in the emancipation of the continent of Africa from centuries of domination and humiliation. It will be a major contribution to the elimination of racism and racial discrimination in the world, and to the strengthening of international peace and security.

34. The World Conference calls on all Governments and peoples to make their fullest contribution in this historic and crucial effort for freedom, peace and international co-operation.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION

/- The World Conference set up a Commission to consider proposals for further action, with special reference to the promotion of increased political and material support to the oppressed people of South Africa and their national liberation movement, and the implementation of United Nations resolutions on apartheid. The report of the Commission was received by the World Conference at its concluding session on 26 August.

Following an assurance by the Chairman of the United Nations Special Committee against Apartheid that the Committee would urgently consider the proposals in the report of the Commission for appropriate action, particularly recommendations to the thirty-second session of the United Nations General Assembly, and would take steps to disseminate the report widely, the Conference decided not to discuss the report of the Commission.

I INTRODUCTION
1. A Commission was set up within the framework of the World Conference to consider proposals for further action, with special reference to the promotion of increased political and material support to the oppressed people of South Africa and their national liberation movement, and the implementation of United Nations resolutions on apartheid. The Commission was open to Member States, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, national liberation movements, anti-apartheid movements, trade unions, women's organizations and other organizations and individuals attending the Conference.

3. The Commission strongly felt that the Programme of Action formulated by the International Seminar on the Eradication of Apartheid and in Support of the Struggle for Liberation in South Africa, held in Havana in May 1976, _/ represented a new stage in the international campaign against apartheid and a high point from which there should be no back-tracking. It therefore decided to take the Programme of Action as the guideline for its work and to restrict its deliberations

to a review of its implementation and proposals for further expanding and strengthening it.

4. Consequently, the conclusions and recommendations of the Commission are presented here as a supplement to the Programme of Action, and should be considered in conjunction with it.

5. The Commission endorsed the statements and proposals for action made by H.E. Lieutenant-General Olusegun Obasanjo, Head of State of Nigeria, H.E. Dr. Kenneth D. Kaunda, President of Zambia, and the leaders of the national liberation movements in the plenary session of the World Conference, and recommends them for implementation by Member States of the United Nations, the specialized agencies of the United Nations and other intergovernmental organizations, as well as non-governmental organizations.

II. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

6. The Commission recognizes that the present situation marks an historic turning point in the struggle for the self-determination and national liberation of the people of South Africa. The Commission is agreed that the primary role in this process must and will be played by the oppressed people of South Africa under the leadership of their national liberation movement, Armed struggle, whose legitimacy has been repeatedly affirmed by the United Nations, is the only means left to the oppressed people to achieve their liberation. Therefore, the Commission considers it absolutely imperative that the international community should intensify efforts at providing all forms of moral and material assistance to the national liberation movement in order to enable it to carry out armed struggle within South Africa.

7. The Commission is convinced that it is also essential to provide assistance for the manpower planning and educational training of cadres of the national liberation movements.

_/ The Programme of Action was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in resolution 31/6J of 9 November 1976, which commended it to all Governments, organizations and individuals. It was also endorsed by the Organization of African Unity and the Conference of Non-aligned Countries.

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8. At the same time, the tremendous repression unleashed by the apartheid regime inside South Africa and the ever-growing flow of refugees make it essential for the international community to devise increased forms of assistance to the oppressed people of South Africa, through the national liberation movement and the programmes in favour of the refugees of the United Nations and of relevant non-governmental organizations, in order to alleviate their sufferings.

9. The Commission strongly feels that the vicious brutality of the apartheid State must be met by strong international action to secure the release of political prisoners, to end ill-treatment and torture in the regime's gaols, and to mete out just punishment to the perpetrators of such ill-treatment and torture. Urgent consideration should be given by the United Nations to ways of enforcing the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid.

10. The Commission is gravely concerned by growing reports of military, and in particular nuclear, collaboration with South Africa. A mandatory embargo under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter on all forms of military and nuclear collaboration with the apartheid regime is absolutely imperative for the peace and security not only of southern Africa but of the world as a whole.

11. The Commission clearly recognizes that, as the present crisis in South Africa deepens, any form of political, economic and other relations with South Africa directly contribute to the survival of the apartheid regime and must thus be seen as abetting the crime of apartheid. A number of Western countries have continued to flout United Nations resolutions on apartheid. Major such offenders are the United Kingdom, the United States of America, the Federal Republic of Germany, France, Israel and Japan. Even some United Nations agencies, such as the International Monetary Fund, continue to provide membership privileges and much needed assistance to the apartheid regime. Such collaboration must be stopped once and for all through the adoption of effective mandatory measures under Chapter VII of the Charter.

12. In the light of the foregoing, the Commission makes the following recommendations which are meant to complement, and ensure the implementation of, the Programme of Action adopted by the General Assembly at its thirtyfirst session.

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A. Recommendations

1. General

13. The Commission urgently calls on all Governments to make every effort to ensure full implementation of the Programme of Action, and to supply the United Nations with information on the implementation of the Programme.

14. The Commission strongly supports the proposed "International Anti-Apartheid Year" in 1978 and calls on all Governments to fully contribute to the United Nations programme for the Year and to facilitate, in all practical ways, activities in observance of the International Year by non-governmental

rganizations, anti-apartheid movements, trade unions and all other organizations and individuals concerned.

2. Military and nuclear collaboration

15. The Commission urges all States:

- (a) To prohibit within their jurisdiction any recruitment of, and advertising for, mercenaries or other military experts for service in or with the South African armed forces and police or security forces and to consider the service by any of their citizens in such a role as a crime to be severely punished;
- (b) To prohibit transit and issuance of identity documents, training or dispatch of mercenaries to fight against the oppressed peoples or against those who have already obtained their independence;
- (c) To grant immediate political asylum to bona fide war resisters and deserters from the apartheid armed forces;
- (d) To terminate henceforth any co-operation with, and training of, intelligence and police agents, communications and cryptographic personnel of the apartheid regime, and to expel immediately such personnel as may be in their countries.

16. The Commission further calls upon INTERPOL to cease all links with the South African regime.

17. The Commission also urges the United Nations Special Committee against Apartheid and the Centre against Apartheid to set up machinery to investigate the South African nuclear potential and military strength, as well as its links with organizations and individuals such as NATO or its staff, and to determine how South Africa obtained its military and nuclear technological know-how.

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18. The Commission urgently appeals to all States, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, liberation movements, and anti-apartheid movements, trade unions, women's organizations and other organizations and individuals to organize without delay a strong and extensive international campaign to prevent the South African regime from carrying through its plan to become a nuclear power. It also calls upon them to adopt effective measures against States, companies, institutions or individuals which collaborate with the racist regime in its plans for nuclear development.

3. Economic Collaboration

19. The Commission calls for an international campaign to persuade the United Nations Security Council to impose mandatory sanctions against the South African regime, under Chapter VII of the Charter, in order to terminate all economic, trade and financial relations with the racist regime.

20. The Commission calls upon Member States to take action against banks, oil companies and other corporations and transnationals which persist in economic collaboration with South Africa.

21. There is an urgent and immediate need to establish, in co-operation

with the OAU, lists of foreign companies, banks and other institutions operating in South Africa in order to facilitate measures against these companies by Governments, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and concerned individuals.

4. Cultural, educational, sporting and other collaboration with South Africa

22. The Commission urges all Governments to end participation of national sporting teams and individual athletes in sporting activities with countries, teams and individuals which maintain sporting contacts with South Africa.

23. It also calls on the United Nations as a matter of urgency to proceed with the International Convention against Apartheid in Sports and urges that such a Convention contain the principle of action against those who collaborate with apartheid sport.

24. It calls on UNESCO to become increasingly involved in the educational aspects of the campaign against apartheid in sport by the promotion and distribution of visual materials, literature and documentary films.

25. It calls on the United Nations and the OAU to convene a meeting of all concerned States, sports bodies and anti-apartheid movements to draw up a detailed strategy aimed at forcing South Africa's expulsion from all international and regional sports organizations.

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26. It calls on all sports organizations to withdraw from the Davis Cup and Federation Cup Tennis Championships unless the International Tennis Federation excludes the racist regime from membership.

5. Assistance to the oppressed people of South Africa and their national liberation movement

27. The Commission calls on all Governments to recognize as the legitimate and authentic representatives of the South African people the liberation movements recognized by the Organization of African Unity and the United Nations.

28. The Commission reiterates the need for financial and material assistance, including military assistance, to these liberation movements.

6. Solidarity with political prisoners

29. The Commission urges the United Nations and all Member States to take all possible steps to ensure that members of the liberation movements recognized by the OAU who are captured as guerrilla fighters by the apartheid regime are accorded prisoner-of-war status and treatment in terms of Protocol 1 of April 1977 of the 1949 Geneva Convention and that visits of inspection can be made by international humanitarian organizations to all combatants detained in the course of the liberation struggle and to civilians detained on suspicion of aiding guerrillas.

30. The Commission expresses its alarm at the current trials taking

place in South Africa under the Terrorism Act and therefore urges the United Nations, Member States, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and all other groups and individuals concerned to mount co-ordinated and extensive international campaigns for the halting of all political trials and the release of the "Pretoria Twelve" and all others on trial or in detention awaiting trial. Such international campaigns should highlight the torture and murder of detainees.

31. The Commission endorses the efforts of the International Committee of the Red Cross to be granted access for its representatives to visit political detainees.

32. The Commission calls on the United Nations and all Member States to seek ways to provide intensified legal and material assistance to political prisoners and their families.

33. The Commission also urges the United Nations Member States, intergovernmental organizations, non-governmental organizations and all other groups and individuals concerned mount a co-ordinated and extensive international campaign for the unconditional release of the leaders of the national liberation movement and all other political prisoners in South Africa and that national committees, where they do not exist, should be established to organize this campaign.

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7. Investigation of cases involving torture and other forms of police brutality

34. The Commission urges that incidents involving indiscriminate shooting, torture and killings of opponents of apartheid be investigated by competent United Nations bodies, such as the Ad Hoc Working Group of Experts of the Commission on Human Rights, which should, in co-operation with the Special Committee against Apartheid, promptly bring the findings to the notice of the General Assembly and of the Security Council.

8. Dissemination of information on apartheid

35. The United Nations Special Committee against Apartheid and the Centre against Apartheid should investigate the possibility of setting up machinery to co-ordinate and assist all information activities of the United Nations, Governments, the liberation movements and nongovernmental organizations.

36. The Commission calls on the United Nations to establish in Africa a section of the United Nations radio.
